Ginny Gingras, our Chapter President, manages to fit a remarkable assortment of rare and choice plants in her compact garden. Surprisingly, many of the plants were large, some several feet high. Sixteen of us followed her around the garden. Stupidly, I took no notes and forgot most of the plant names. I do remember a huge Arisaema ringens and Heuchera villosa, a native resembling a dwarf tiarella. There were also many troughs in sun and shade, and even a Venus flytrap (kept indoors) with a hapless victim in its jaws/claws. We were in the midst of a drought (which has lasted the whole month of August) and I envied Ginny her high water table. She has well water, and has been using her rain barrel which drains water from the roof. But even out of reach of the rain barrel she is able to grow beautiful cardinal flowers (Lobelia cardinalis) in several locations. All grew from seed from a single plant!

The lunch, as ever, was delicious. Lots of salads, many from home gardens, refreshing cold drinks and delicious desserts were offered. After lunch we held the annual business meeting. Ginny hoped for someone to take the reins of the Presidency, but was gracious about continuing as Chair when there were no volunteers. Maryanne Gryboski continues as Newsletter Editor/Programming Coordinator, Barbara van Achterberg as Secretary and Sally Katkaveck as Treasurer. We are looking for more help with programming and hospitality.

Jeana Richo, impressed with Matt Mattus' label making, described how she makes labels using the Brother PT-1230 PC label maker and finds that they last. She also copied my technique of listing plants in alphabetical order in a card file box, but goes a step further: she not only tells where the plants are located in the garden but also pastes pictures of them on the cards, and very neatly too.

Late in September we will meet at Ballek's Garden Center, and in October the Tri-state Meeting will once again be at the New York Botanical Garden with free admission for NARGS members. Emily Ferguson suggested taking a trip to Tower Hill in Boylston, Massachusetts.

After the meeting we had a plant sale. Ginny then dug up perennial begonias, *Begonia grandiflora*, for all who wanted them. My three plants purchased at the sale are still in their pots waiting for rain, the *Lobelia syphilitica* having begun to bloom in its pot.
