As the highlight of our Annual Meeting we present a chance to hear directly from Jill Nooney how the venture grew from small beginnings to a multi-component ensemble.

Bedrock Gardens is certainly a creation that profits from the virtue that its owners Jill Nooney and Bob Munger have lived on this "farm" for 36 years doing most of the development themselves. Over time the owners have been susceptible to the same enthusiasms for dwarf conifers, ornamental grasses, architectural elements, and sculptural ornaments that have enticed all of us. In many hands such collecting would lead to a Fibber McGee's closet, but in Jill and Bob's hands their artfulness has led to a flowing whole.
