THE PLANT THAT ALL ARE PRAISING IS NOT THE PLANT FOR ME

Rock gardeners are hearty souls with their feet on the ground and our roots in the rocks but sometimes we have "quirks." This state of mind keeps us *au courant* and adventurous in our thinking; we take our cue from a quote, attributed to several people, including Thomas Haynes Bayly and Alexander Bain in the mid-nineteenth century:

The rose that all are praising, is not the rose for me;
Too many eyes are gazing
Upon the costly tree:
But there's a rose in yonder glen,
That shuns the gaze of other men,
For me its blossoms raising:
Oh, that's the rose for me.

Ellen Borker will begin by truly praising one or many of the roses in her Brooklyn garden. The Rosa banksiae 'Lutea' that thrives in her front garden ... promptly died in her back yard!

Lola Horwitz's eyes are gazing on *Codonopsis lutea*, an underused vine that has a winning quality of intriguingly beautiful flower. The early fall coloration of its leaves unlike other vines. Apparently, those who use medicinal herbs (roots, in this case) appreciate a fellow Codonopsis species as a ready substitute for ginseng.

Michael Riley will explain why the prick of the rose is not the only prick in the garden, in his discussion of Opuntia. This genus has many qualities of horticultural, culinary and defensive natures; perhaps there is one for you?

~THE ROCK GARDEN IN SPRING~

"I have just been browsing through an old book on rock garden plants and have come across a photograph, obviously taken in April, of a titanic struggle between battalions of golden-yellow alyssum and hordes of invading aubrieta. I would like to think that it was included as a warning to those who would recklessly play with bright colours but I fear it is meant to stand as a shining example of the gardener's art and one worthy of emulation. April [May] is a dangerous month in the rock garden. There is an eruption of colour in a relatively small area and unless you are careful you can be knocked over by the flying particles. Alyssums and aubrietas are likely to be your most potent ingredients. They do not need to be kept apart but a thoughtful selection of their different shades and a firm hand in positioning them are essential.

... For associations involving the more aggressively coloured aubrietas, the reddish purples, mauves and carmines, I would always choose the creamy lemon form of alyssum called 'Citrinum'. In these partnerships either 'Citrinum' or the aubrietas can dominate, depending on what sort of effect you want – a channel of cream or a massif of purple. The leaves of alyssum are quite silvery and make a good foil for later flowers"

~MANHATTAN CHAPTER SERVICE AWARD~

[Editor's note: The chapter's first service award will be given to Tom Stuart at the NARGS Annual Meeting in Steamboat Springs in late June. The following are excerpts from his nomination application. Congratulations to Tom for earning this tribute and many thanks for his generous support of and service to the chapter over many decades.]

Tom Stuart is being nominated for a NARGS Chapter Service Award for several reasons, foremost his generosity to our annual chapter plant sale. Those who have attended the plant sale for many years will remember the surge of shoppers that met Tom upon his late arrival due to the Five-Boro Bike Race, which paralyzed Manhattan traffic. He barely had time to unload his flats of plants before knowledgeable gardeners had seized their prizes, beautifully grown blooming-size specimens of choice plants, including *Cypripedium acaule v.* pubescens, *Trillium grandiflorum v.* rosea, *Glaucidium palmatum 'Album'*, *Jeffersonia dubia, Primula sieboldii, Anemonella thalictroides 'Cameo', Uvularia grandiflora, Sanguinaria canadensis, Maianthemum racemosa, Hepatica* species and cultivars, little known ferns and rare *Corydalis*. This generosity has continued over many years and has been a significant ongoing source of chapter revenue, supporting the speakers program and other chapter activities.

Tom has shared his extensive knowledge of ferns in chapter talks and newsletter articles and has hosted several chapter tours of his and Ernie's steep hillside garden, which features a large collection of rock and woodland plants. Tom has led by example as a grower and propagator and furthered each of our interests in rock and woodland gardening.

In addition to his plant donations, Tom has also stored Larry Thomas' fine collection of garden books in his house, awaiting a time when the chapter could sell them at a suitable venue. Many books were sold in the recent chapter plant sale, and more will be offered at the Tri-State Meeting in October. All sales will benefit the chapter. This award is offered with deep appreciation for all Tom has done for the Manhattan Chapter over many years and serves as an example for all members.

~ WHY DON'T YOU? ~

- ~ Take a few minutes each day to just breathe in spring's heady perfection? Yes, there are infinite tasks to be performed, but appreciate the effects you've achieved and the tasks completed. You'll have plenty of time to get back to them.
- ~ Pull perennial tap-rooted and rhizomatous weeds while the ground is still soft and moist? Goutweed and ground ivy may not be eliminated in one or even several seasons, but they can be considerably reduced by regular effort. If you remove weeds before they bloom and set seed you're that much further ahead.
- ~ Make time to see other gardens and borrow the ideas that work for you? Experiment with new and unfamiliar plants, path materials, mulches, fencing and enclosures, horticultural techniques, color and textural combinations.

~ Inventory spring bulb and ephemerals displays before they go dormant? Make note of gaps and bare spots so they can be filled in the fall.
